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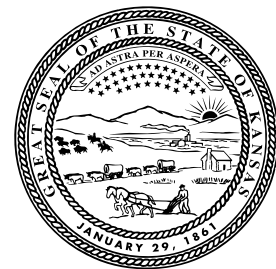

Public notice is hereby given that Wichita State University (WSU), directly or through its affiliate corporation Wichita State Innovation Alliance, Inc., intends to lease, subject to all required state approvals, up to four acres of real property located on the “Innovation Campus,” for the private development and operation of a partnership building or buildings. The university is interested in leasing such ground to any individual, organization, or entity whose presence on campus would advance the university’s applied learning vision or its mission as an educational, cultural, and economic driver for Kansas and the greater public good. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has reviewed an application from Bourbon County, to add a source-separated organic waste and yard waste composting facility to their existing construction and demolition landfill and waste transfer station permit number 0512. Approved source-separated items requested for composting are waste grain, wood chips, and spent soybeans. The composting pad will be constructed about

350 feet straight south of the waste transfer station. In the future, additional source-separated materials may be composted if specifically approved by KDHE.

The composting facility will be located at 2274 Noble Rd., Fort Scott, Kansas, in the SW4 of Section 17-T25S-R25E. The annual weight of incoming organic material is expected to be 1,000 tons. The entrance to the composting facility (and transfer station) will be fenced, gated, and locked, except during business hours.

KDHE has reviewed the application from the Bourbon County to expand their existing permit number 0512, through the Bureau of Waste Management, and has found the application to be in conformance with state solid waste statutes and regulations. KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to add yard waste and source-separated waste composting to the existing Bourbon County permit, at the existing county property described herein. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has a 45-day review period, which will start concurrently with the public comment period, within which to object to the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA to review the permit. The 60-day public petition period will directly follow the EPA's 45-day review period. Interested parties may contact KDHE to determine if the EPA's 45-day review period has been waived.

Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. Opinion No. 2022-04

Written June 22, 2022 to John Cozine, Esq., Associate Director, Compliance Services, State and Federal Communications, Inc., 80 S. Summit St., Suite 100, Akron, Ohio 44308.

Synopsis: Under the facts provided, this opinion provides an analysis of the “employed in a considerable degree for lobbying” statutory language defining lobbyists, and the prohibition on contingency compensation for lobbying.

Cited herein: K.S.A. 46-222, 46-225, and 46-267; K.A.R. 19-62-1; and Ethics Opinions 1974-56, 1975-7, and 1975-85.

Mr. Cozine,

This opinion is in response to your May 9, 2022, request for an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the lobbying provisions of the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission’s jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theo-

ry or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

The opinion request provides the following facts:

In light of the broad registration requirements and contingency fee bans, we request an advisory opinion to assist in determining the parameters under which a salesperson who receives sales commissions for completed contracts with the state as part of his or her employment contract can sell to the state without running afoul of either the lobbyist registration requirements or contingency fee ban.

Company employees engaged in sales to government entities are paid under compensation plans which pay them commissions based on successfully completed contracts with governmental entities. Other employees, serving in more of a support role, received bonuses based on the overall sales success of their organization within the company. Employees may be assigned to sell, or support sales, exclusively in Kansas, or may have Kansas as a part of a larger, multi-state territory.

Questions

1. If a person is hired primarily to engage in government sales in a territory which includes Kansas and the employee engages with executive agency officials in an attempt to sell its company's products and services to the government and the employee does not engage with the legislative branch, are they considered by K.S.A. 46-222(a)(1) to be a person employed in considerable degree for lobbying requiring registration as a lobbyist in Kansas?
2. Does the answer change if Kansas is the only state in the employee's assigned territory?
3. Under K.S.A. 46-222(a)(2), would a person hired primarily to engage in government sales in a territory which includes Kansas be considered the primary representative of an organization if the organization has no "traditional" lobbyists registered to represent them in Kansas? Does the answer change if Kansas is the only state in which they are engaged in sales?
4. If required to register as a lobbyist are sales commissions paid upon closing a contract with the state barred by the contingency fee ban contained in K.S.A. 46-267(a)?
5. If required to register as a lobbyist, are bonuses paid to employees based on the overall sales success of their organization within the company, but not tied to any particular contract, barred by the contingency fee ban contained in K.S.A. 46-267(a)?
6. Are there any circumstances, other than the narrow exceptions contained in K.S.A. 46-225(g)(1), (4), and (5), that would permit a person engaged in selling to the state to be paid sales commissions?
7. Can you offer any additional guidance around what constitutes a "considerable degree" of lobbying in Kansas?

Analysis and Opinion

An employee who engages with an agency of the executive branch of Kansas government for a contract of more than \$5,000 is lobbying. In pertinent part, lobbying is defined in K.S.A. 46-225:

(a) Except as otherwise provided, "lobbying" means: ... (2) promoting or opposing in any manner an action or nonaction by any executive agency on any executive administrative matter.

...

(g) Lobbying does not include ... (5) communications regarding a contract, lease, or agreement of \$5,000 or less.

And "executive agency matter" and "executive agency" mean:

(h) ... "executive administrative matter" means any rule and regulation, utility ratemaking decision, any agreement, contract, bid or bid process, or any procurement decision, including, but not limited to, any financial services agreement, software licensing, servicing or procurement agreement, any lease, grant, award, loan, bond issue, certificate, license, permit, administrative order or any other matter that is within the official jurisdiction or cognizance of the executive agency.

...

(j) ... "executive agency" means any state agency, state office or state officer, state officer elect, or employee of the executive branch and includes but is not limited to, the board of regents and state board of education, but does not include local boards of education of school districts or municipalities or other political subdivisions.

The statutory definition of "executive agency matter" includes any contract. Seeking a contract from an "executive agency" necessarily requires promoting action by an executive agency. Consequently, an employee, employed in considerable degree as described in question one, is a lobbyist pursuant to K.S.A. 46-222(a)(1). Whether the territory assigned is limited to Kansas does not affect the conclusion that the salesperson is a lobbyist.

As provided in K.S.A. 46-222(a), there are four lobbyist definitions. Meeting any one of these means the employee is a lobbyist. The premise in question three (an employee who is hired primarily to lobby executive agencies for sales) means the employee is a lobbyist as provided in subparagraph (a)(1). Question two, regarding the subparagraph (a)(2) definition of lobbyist, is moot. Notwithstanding, K.A.R. 19-62-1(b) provides that "[w]here an appointment is made in conjunction with an employment status as set out in subsection (a) of this section, the provisions of that subsection shall control as to whether the employed person must register as a lobbyist."

We next consider K.S.A. 46-267, which provides in pertinent part:

(a) No person shall pay or accept or agree to pay or accept or arrange for a third party to pay or agree to pay present, future, promised or contingent compensation, or any part thereof, for lobby-

(continued)

ing which is contingent upon the result achieved or attained.

(b) No person shall pay or accept or agree to pay or accept present, future, promised or contingent compensation, or any part thereof, for the referral of a person or persons to a lobbyist for lobbying services.

The subsection (a) and (b) provisions apply to sales commissions paid upon closing of a contract with the state and to bonuses paid to employees based upon overall sales success even if not tied to any particular contract. Such contingency compensation arrangements are prohibited for lobbyists when lobbying as defined in K.S.A. 46-225(a). The prohibition is not applicable to interactions with executive agencies which are excepted from the lobbying definition as enumerated in subsection (g), or otherwise not meeting the definition of lobbying.

We have discussed the “employed in considerable degree for lobbying” statutory language. In Opinion No. 1974-56, we said:

The Commission now directs your attention to the employment provision. We first note that unlike the appointment provision, it is irrelevant where the employed person lobbies. In other words, if a person is employed to lobby, that person must register before engaging in lobby activities regardless of whether he or she ever contacts a state officer or employee in person on state owned or operated property in Shawnee County.

We also wish to draw your attention to the modifying parenthetical phrase “(in whole or in part)”. It is the Commission’s opinion that this phrase does not include every person whose duties include to a minute degree lobbying. Rather, to be within the phrase “in part”, the purpose of the employment must be to a considerable degree for lobbying. Thus, a corporate executive who as part of his employment provision. However, where a person is hired in considerable degree to lobby, it is irrelevant that the lobbying is not a considerable amount of his or her overall business. Therefore, an attorney or other professional person who is specifically employed to a considerable degree to lobby must register regardless of the fact that the lobbying is not a considerable degree of his or her business or firm’s business.

In Opinion 1975-7, we noted:

In the situation where the individual is invited to attend such hearings in his capacity as an employee of another, however, the employment provision would be applicable but only to the extent [sic] the purpose of the employment is to a considerable degree test is met depends on a variety of factors. Without going into detail in this opinion on what factors will be considered in determining whether the considerable degree test is met, we note as a general rule that a limited number of appearances of the nature described above would not, solely on account of such appearanc-

es, require an individual to register as a lobbyist under the employment provision.

Perhaps the most definitive guidance about the “employed in considerable degree for lobbying” statutory language is in K.A.R. 19-62-1(a):

Employed lobbyists. Each person whose employment is, to a considerable degree, for the purpose of lobbying shall register as a lobbyist. A person is employed if the person receives compensation for or in direct relation to lobbying regardless of the technical legal definition of the relationship between the principal and the lobbyist. An executive of an organization who as part of the executive’s duties incidentally lobbies shall not be required to register under this subsection. However, where a person is employed to a considerable degree for the purpose of lobbying it is irrelevant that the lobbying employment is not a substantial amount of the person’s overall business. In determining whether an individual is employed to a considerable degree to lobby, that portion of the employment which relates to preparation for lobbying shall be taken into consideration.

Conclusion

As we indicated in Opinion 1975-85, “[w]hether the considerable degree test is met depends on a variety of factors, including the amount of time devoted to matters related to lobbying.” To the extent that the questions discussed in this opinion are general, the circumstances they present would require registration as a lobbyist. In instances of more specific scenarios, a case-by-case discussion with agency staff may be of benefit to determine whether registration is necessary.

Executive Order No. 22-05

WHEREAS, the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) is managed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA); and

WHEREAS, floods can happen anywhere and cause significant damage to property and loss of lives; and

WHEREAS, some communities choose to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations that help mitigate flooding effects and these communities are referred to as NFIP participating communities; and

WHEREAS, the State of Kansas is generally self-insured for risk of property loss below catastrophic levels; and

WHEREAS, the State of Kansas has an interest in protecting State assets against the risk of flood damage and loss;

NOW, THEREFORE pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby order as follows:

Whenever proposed construction of a state-owned development is to occur in a FEMA designated flood-prone area in a non-NFIP participating community, the Kansas Department of Administration shall require review of the proposed development to assure that:

1. All necessary permits have been received from those governmental agencies from which approval is required by Federal or State law, including section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334.
2. If the proposed construction is not in a NFIP participating community and the proposed building site is in a flood-prone area, all new construction and substantial improvements shall (i) be designed (or modified) and adequately anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy, (ii) be constructed with materials resistant to flood damage, (iii) be constructed by methods and practices that minimize flood damages, and (iv) be constructed with electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing, and air conditioning equipment and other service facilities that are designed and/or located so as to prevent water from entering or accumulating within the components during conditions of flooding.
3. New and replacement water supply systems are designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood water into the systems.
4. New and replacement sanitary sewage systems are designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and onsite waste disposal systems are located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding; and
5. All other applicable requirements of 44 C.F.R. 60.3(a) through 44 C.F.R. 60.3(d) and any other relevant requirement of Federal or State law are met.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order 22-05 and shall become effective immediately.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulations during the public hearing. Phone comments will be taken by calling 1-877-278-8686 (access code 266223) at the time of the hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request an accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. K.A.R. 60-11-101. Definition of expanded role. The proposed revisions for this regulation delete the definition for a collaborative agreement with a responsible physician for licensed APRNs to practice in Kansas. The definitions of authorization for collaborative practice, physician, prescription and prescription order will be deleted. There is no economic impact difference to the Board of Nursing. Communication of the changes can be communicated to APRNs and stakeholders via existing communication venues. This change will eliminate the barrier that requires APRNs to have a collaborative agreement with a responsible physician. There may be some economic impact on businesses and the general public as there will be increased access to healthcare for the citizens of Kansas.

K.A.R. 60-11-103. Licensure and educational requirements for advanced practice registered nurses. The proposed revision adds language about the requirement for proof of APRN certification in the applicant's specific role and population focus for initial licensure applications submitted on and after July 1, 2023. Language was also added regarding the requirement to submit proof of malpractice insurance coverage if the applicant renders professional clinical services as an APRN, unless the APRN meets one of the exceptions listed in K.S.A. 65-1130 as amended by S Sub for HB 2279. The economic impact to the Board of Nursing is expenditure costs to update our licensing software to have the ability to document the proof of national certification and proof of malpractice insurance (approximately \$30,000). There may be an economic impact for the applicants for APRN licensure who do not currently have national certification and malpractice insurance, as they will need to obtain both. There is no economic impact on business or the general public. It is estimated access to healthcare will increase for the citizens of Kansas.

K.A.R. 60-11-104. Functions of the advanced practice registered nurse in the role of nurse practitioner. The proposed regulation deletes the "based on authoriza-

tion for collaborative practice” language for practicing as a nurse practitioner licensed in Kansas. There is no economic impact difference to the Board of Nursing for these proposed revisions. There is no economic impact on businesses or the general public. It is estimated access to healthcare will increase for the citizens of Kansas.

K.A.R. 60-11-104a. Prescription orders. Language was stricken about the need for a written protocol approved by the responsible physician. Language was added to include that APRNs are allowed to prescribe. There is no economic impact difference to the Board of Nursing for these proposed revisions.

K.A.R. 60-11-105. Functions of the advanced practice registered nurse in the role of nurse-midwife. The language “based on the authorization for collaborative practice” was stricken since the legislation eliminated the need for a collaborative agreement for a nurse-midwife to practice. There is no economic impact difference to the Board of Nursing for this proposed revision. It is estimated access to healthcare will increase for the citizens of Kansas.

K.A.R. 60-11-107. Functions of the advanced practice registered nurse in the role of clinical nurse specialist. The language “based on the authorization for collaborative practice” was stricken since the legislation eliminated the need for a collaborative agreement for a clinical nurse specialist to practice. There is no economic impact difference to the Board of Nursing for this proposed revision. It is estimated access to healthcare will increase for the citizens of Kansas.

K.A.R. 60-11-113. License renewal. Language was added that states for any APRN whose initial licensure is before July 1, 2023, the APRN may submit evidence of APRN certification at the time of license renewal. Language was also added that states an APRN shall provide proof of malpractice insurance coverage when renewing the license if the APRN renders professional clinical services, unless the APRN meets one of the exceptions listed in K.S.A. 65-1130 as amended by S Sub for HB 2279. There will be an economic impact for any APRNs that must have malpractice insurance and do not presently have it.

Economic Impact:

Cost to the agency: The proposed amended regulation will require staff time to update the agency handbook, “Kansas Laws and Regulations for Licensing Day Care Homes and Group Day Care Homes for Children.” The costs for the update of the handbook and printing will be absorbed in the ongoing KDHE budget.

Cost to licensees: The proposed amended regulation has no implementation or compliance costs to child care licensees.

Costs to other governmental agencies or units: The proposed amended regulation applies to local units of government, including cities and counties, that operate a day care home or group day care home. For those licensees, there are no implementation or compliance costs.

A detailed economic impact is provided in the economic impact statement that is available from the designated KDHE contact staff person or at the KDHE Child Care Licensing website, as listed below.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE), Division of Public Health, Bureau of Family Health, will conduct a public hearing at 9:00 a.m. Friday, September 9, 2022, in Room 530, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 SW Jackson, Topeka, Kansas, to consider the adoption of proposed amended maternal and child health regulations K.A.R. 28-4-520 and 28-4-521, regarding the start and implementation of the Kansas Birth Defects Program.

A summary of the proposed regulations and estimated economic impact follows:

Summary of Regulations:

K.A.R. 28-4-520. Definitions. Removes behavioral disorders from the definition of abnormal condition. Removes outdated ICD-9 references and defined ICD-9 codes. Adds the defined term notifiable condition. Removes the defined term primary diagnosis.

K.A.R. 28-4-521. Reporting notifiable conditions. Changes the reporting of abnormal conditions and congenital anomalies to the reporting only of notifiable conditions. Removes reporting requirements, method of reporting, and removal of reported information. Adopts department document "Kansas Birth Defects Surveillance Reporting Manual."

Economic Impact:

Cost to the agency: The proposed regulations will not result in increased costs to the agency.

Cost to the public and regulated community: The proposed regulations will not result in increased costs to the public and regulated community.

Costs to other governmental agencies or units: The proposed regulations will not result in increased costs to other governmental agencies or units.

A detailed economic impact is provided in the economic impact statement that is available from the designated KDHE contact staff person or at the Kansas Birth Defects Program website, as listed below.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulations as well as an opportunity to submit their written comments. It is requested that each individual giving oral comments also provide a written copy of the comments for the record. In order to give each individual an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary for the hearing officer to request that each presenter limit an oral presentation to an appropriate time frame.

Permanent Administrative Regulation

Article 2.—CPA EXAM APPLICATION AND EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

74-2-7. Concentration in accounting. (a) The "concentration in accounting" courses required to qualify for admission to the certified public accountant examination shall be as follows:

(1) At least 42 semester credit hours in business and general education courses, including the following:

(A) A macroeconomics course, a microeconomics course, and one upper-division economics course;

(B) at least two courses in the legal aspects of business or business law;

(C) college algebra or higher-level math course;

(D) statistics and probability theory course;

(E) information systems and applications course, which shall be equivalent to at least a 200-level course;

(F) finance course;

(G) management and administration course;

(H) marketing course; and

(I) production, operations research, or applications of quantitative techniques to business problems course;

(2) at least 11 semester credit hours in courses in written and oral communications;

(3) at least 30 semester credit hours in courses in accounting theory and practice, including the following:

(A) Financial accounting and reporting for business organizations course, which may include any of the following:

- (i) Intermediate accounting course;
- (ii) advanced accounting course; or
- (iii) accounting theory course;

(B) managerial accounting beyond an introductory course;

(C) auditing course concentrating on auditing standards generally accepted in the United States as issued by the AICPA auditing standards board or the PCAOB, or both;

(D) U.S. income tax course; and

(E) accounting systems beyond an introductory computer course; and

(4) commencing January 1, 2024 for all initial examination applicants, a course in data analytics for business or accounting, which shall be equivalent to at least a 200-level course.

(b) The following types of credits awarded by a college or university approved by the board shall be accepted by the board for purposes of determining compliance with subsection (a), if the credits are related to those areas specified in subsection (a):

- (1) Credit for advanced placement;
- (2) credit by examination;
- (3) credit for military education; and
- (4) credit for competency gained through experience.

Credits recognized by the board pursuant to this subsection shall not exceed a total of six semester hours.

(c) Credit for courses taken for pass-fail credit shall be accepted by the board for purposes of determining compliance with subsection (a) and shall be limited to a total of six semester hours, unless the applicant demonstrates to the satisfaction of the board that the awarded grade of "pass" is equivalent to a 3.0 grade point on a grading scale of 0.0 to 4.0.

(d) Credit shall not be allowed for any course that is only audited.

(e) Credit shall not be allowed for any course for which credit has already been received.

(f) Any credits earned for an accounting internship may count toward the overall 150-hour education requirement, but these credits shall not be acceptable in satisfaction of the required concentration in accounting courses.

(g) Credits earned for CPA exam review courses shall not be acceptable in satisfaction of the required concentration in accounting courses. However, these credits may be used toward the overall 150-hour education requirement.

(h) Not to exceed a total of six hours, up to three hours of course requirements specified in paragraph (a)(1), (a)(2), or (a)(3) may be waived by the board, upon the applicant's demonstration of compelling circumstances and upon receipt of satisfactory verification that the applicant has otherwise met the requirements. Article 6. — MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM — CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

129-6-103. Determined eligibles; income standards. (a) Independent living arrangements.

(1) The income standard for each person in an independent living arrangement shall be based on the total number of persons in the assistance plan as defined in K.A.R. 129-6-41 or 129-6-42.

(2) The income standards for independent living may also be used if an applicant or recipient meets either of the following conditions:

(A) Enters a medicaid-approved facility, except that this paragraph shall not apply if only one spouse in a married couple enters an institutional living arrangement; or

(B) is absent from the home for medical care for a period not to exceed the month in which the person left the home and the two months following to allow for maintaining the applicant's or recipient's independent living arrangements.

(3) Except as specified in paragraphs (a)(4) through (13), the following table shall be used to determine the income standard for persons in an independent living arrangement.

Persons in Independent Living (per month)		
1	2	3
\$475	\$475	\$480

The income standard for additional persons shall be the sum of the basic standard for a similar public assistance family and the maximum state shelter standard in accordance with K.A.R. 30-4-101.

(4) In determining eligibility for pregnant women under K.A.R. 129-6-71 and for infants under K.A.R. 129-6-72(b), the income standard shall be 166 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(5) In determining eligibility for young children under K.A.R. 129-6-72(c), the income standard shall be 149 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(6) In determining eligibility for older children under K.A.R. 129-6-72(d), the income standard shall be 133 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(7) In determining eligibility for poverty-level medicare beneficiaries under K.A.R. 129-6-86, the income standard shall be 100 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(continued)

(8) In determining eligibility for working disabled individuals under K.A.R. 129-6-87, the income standard shall be 200 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(9) In determining eligibility for low-income medicare beneficiaries under K.A.R. 129-6-86, the income standard shall be 120 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(10) In determining eligibility for expanded low-income medicare beneficiaries under K.A.R. 129-6-86, the income standard shall be 120 to 135 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines, subject to available federal funding.

(11) In determining eligibility for disabled individuals with earned income under K.A.R. 129-6-88, the income standard shall be 300 percent of the official federal poverty-level income guidelines.

(12) In determining eligibility for persons in the medikan program under K.A.R. 129-6-95, the income standard shall be \$250 for a single individual and \$325 for a married couple.

(13) In determining eligibility for persons in long-term care arrangements in accordance with K.A.R. 129-6-54(d) (1), the income standard shall be 300 percent of the pay-

ment standard for one person in the SSI program. For calendar year 2013, the income standard shall be \$2,130, and this amount shall be increased at the beginning of each calendar year by any cost-of-living adjustment made to the SSI payment standard.

(b) Institutional living arrangements. For each person residing in an institutional setting, the monthly income standard for purposes of determining the client obligation shall be \$62, except as specified in paragraph (a)(2).

(c) Home- and community-based services arrangements. For each person in the HCBS program, including any person in the PACE program who is in a noninstitutional living arrangement in accordance with K.A.R. 129-6-83(b), the monthly income standard for purposes of determining the client obligation shall be 300 percent of the payment standard for one person in the SSI program.
